

Car Accident? Here Are 8 Steps You Should Follow Immediately!

“My back pains are killing me; why didn’t I rush to an Emergency center after the accident?!”

“How do I claim insurance for my car? Obviously, I didn’t know anything about photographic evidence!”

Florida is more than often ranked as one of the States in the US with the highest number of road and motor vehicle accidents. It only makes sense for Florida residents to remain aware of the precautions and steps to follow if, mighty heavens, an accident occurs!

No matter how cautious you are, accidents are inevitable. So if you do not know already, you can find out what necessary steps you should immediately follow after a road accident in this article. These include actions from a medical, general as well as legal perspective.

8 Steps to Take Immediately After A Road Accident

Provided that you are in your senses after the accident, you should follow these steps to avoid any problems later on.

- 1 • ***DO NOT Run and Flee!***
- 2 • ***Quickly Survey Around to See If Anyone Is Hurt***
- 3 • ***Call the Florida Car Police***
- 4 • ***Avoid Making Any Abrupt Statements***
- 5 • ***Exchange Information With the People Involved***
- 6 • ***Photograph the Accident Scene***
- 7 • ***Inform Your Insurance Company***
- 8 • ***Seek Legal Advice***

1. DO NOT Run and Flee!

Even if it was not your fault that the accident occurred, fleeing the situation would put you off in a bad light and portray you as a criminal.

Even if you have not sustained any injuries, Rushing in such a scene is not a sensible thing to do. Rushing now would only result in ill fate on you later in the form of legal action.

2. Quickly Survey Around to See If Anyone Is Hurt

Depending on the accident, major or minor injuries can be sustained. You need to quickly check who was involved in the accident and call 911 if someone has been seriously hurt. This needs to be done on an instant basis to avoid any fatalities.

3. Call the Florida Car Police

The concerned Area Police must be notified regarding any road accident that occurs. The police will secure the accident scene, note down all the details, and produce an official Accident Report.

The Accident Report acts as the ultimate piece of evidence for litigation purposes later on. Therefore, make sure that the Police is present straight away after the accident.

Do not forget to get a copy of the report and note down the names of the officers who were on duty to get a copy later on.

4. Avoid Making Any Abrupt Statements

Understandably, you would be compelled towards apologizing after an accident; however, you need to refrain from quickly pleading, "I'm sorry that was my fault!"

Such statements can lead to an Admission of Fault, where the accident's blame will immediately be shifted over you in the record. Instead, deal with the matter on a clear-headed scale and speak without haste.

5. Exchange Information With the People Involved

While you need to keep your interactions to a minimum to avoid making any statements, you need to extract information from all the people involved in the accident. This includes the driver with whom you probably collided and the pedestrians nearby.

You can ask for information such as their names, addresses, and phone numbers. This is necessary because their insight into the accident can prove useful for being included in the Accident Report.

6. Photograph the Accident Scene

Pictures and images are often the most valuable evidence, especially in litigation or claiming insurance. You can use your smartphone to photograph the scene and even record a brief video of the scene.

7. Inform Your Insurance Company

In order to claim your respective insurance, you must inform your Insurance Company right away. While this may appear off-setting, you will be required to answer many questions by the Insurance agent. However, this is essential so that you can claim your Insurance without hurdles.

8. Seek Legal Advice

In cases where major or serious injuries were involved, you should not hesitate to soliciting legal counsel. Before you are subject to legal action yourself, it is better to seek legal counsel and prepare yourself for the necessary legal proceedings.
